Type in a number, address or name. Any one piece may get you the rest. There are three databases to use from this site.

If you are curious to see what others can find out about you, type yourself in. The results might persuade you to opt out of listing services. Anyone vigilant in keeping their information private won't be found through this site.

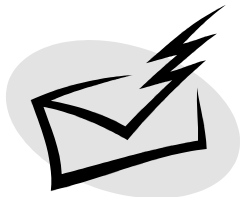

Aren't you tired of credit card offers? Been pre-approved for every credit card on the planet. To reduce junk mail, go to OptOutPrescreen.com.

Legally, your credit information is open to creditors and insurance companies. They examine your credit rating and make you offers.



If you choose to opt-out, your name is off the credit companies' lists. Your information will no longer be provided for unsolicited offers.

If you previously opted out, you can use this site to opt-in. Otherwise, you are "in" by default.

This will not take you off of all mailing lists. Companies can still make you offers. You just won't appear on the credit-reporting companies' lists, which are used to generate many offers. Still, any less junk mail is an improvement.
