You could spend hours perusing the collection. If you're like me, you probably will. Keep in mind the photographs are free for browsing. If you want to reproduce them, you will need to pay a fee.

TIME AND DATE PRINTED DOCUMENTS

Having the date appear on your printouts is pretty handy. Most programs let you add a date in some way. Let's go through some programs you may be using.

Microsoft Word Click where you want to place the date. Click Insert>>Date and Time. You will have a selection of choices--date only, time only and date and time. Choose one and click OK.

You can make Word insert dates in all documents automatically. To do that, you must change the Word template. That is a file named Normal.dot.

You'll find it in these folders:
